# **Unique Internship Opportunity** Fosters a Homecoming for Kings Mountain Native

Kings Mountain native, Vega Weston, is fulfilling an exciting opportunity to support the community through her summer internship at Albemarle.

"I was born and raised in Kings Mountain," she said. "I graduated from Kings Mountain High School. I've been here my whole life, and my family has lived here for as far back as I can remember."

As a first-generation college student at North Carolina State University, Vega adds, "Having a company like Albemarle in Kings Mountain allows me to come back and work here in my desired field when previously, that wasn't an option." A business major with a minor in global leadership and team development, Vega's interest was piqued when she visited the Albemarle Kings Mountain website to inquire about internship opportunities and found an opening with the community affairs team.

In her role with the community affairs team, she has had numerous opportunities to connect and reconnect with the Kings Mountain community even participating in an event at her alma mater.

"I work with two of my former high school teachers from chemistry and natural science," she said. "It's cool to come back and work as a team. They've been able to mentor me further and show me how things operate in the workplace."

Vega says Albemarle's internship program has been great from a guidance standpoint. "Everyone has been teaching me so much and they support me both professionally and personally. I'm very grateful for their mentorship."

Vega helps organize and participate in Albemarle's community meetings and open houses, as well as sponsored events with nonprofit partners. She is currently organizing a charity kickball tournament for employees.

In her role with the Albemarle Foundation, Vega is instrumental in supporting a new tool that allows employees to find volunteer opportunities in the area. For every volunteer hour logged in the portal, Albemarle makes a \$25 donation to an organization of the employee's choosing. If an employee chooses to donate funds as well, the Albemarle Foundation will match the donation up to \$4,000.

Vega also spends time reaching out to area non-profit organizations to potentially form partnerships with Albemarle, noting that she is helping to organize a volunteer fair for employees to connect with community organizations and volunteer opportunities.

"Albemarle has opened doors to better working opportunities. With the potential opening of the mine, there is an opportunity for a significant number of wellpaying and stable jobs in the community," she added.



# **Mitigating Potential Visual Impacts** of the Proposed Mine Through Landscape Planning and Design

As Albemarle plans for the potential redevelopment of the Kings Mountain Mine, anticipating the compatibility of the proposed mine's features with the existing landscape is crucial. This process involves selecting materials, plants and designs that blend with the local environment. A team of geospatial consultants working with Albemarle are designing landscapes to improve the views surrounding the mine property through carefully planned structures and features. These proposed features are designed to limit project visibility through planted berms, native tree planting and other features compatible with the existing area's landscape.

The consultants are using a visual impact assessment to identify existing views from various locations around the mine site that may be impacted by the construction and operation of the mine. Once the existing visuals are identified, evaluations will be made on the potential scenery changes that may occur from the construction and operation of the mine, along with their impact on the aesthetic character of the landscape. Rock storage facilities (RSF), where non-ore-bearing rock gathered from mining are planned to be stored, are the most commonly visible mine facilities. The tailings storage facility and other project structures, such as support buildings, are anticipated to be partially visible from nearby existing roads.

The natural areas around the mine site offer diverse trees, plants and landscapes that provide seasonal color and buffering from the proposed mine facilities. The proposed visual elements to be constructed would add similar elements, while also increasing the diversity of the landscape. By strategically placing and landscaping these berms with native plants, the visual impact of the mine can be significantly reduced.


